Dear Parent/Carer,

We would like to thank those of you who were able to complete our parent/carer home learning questionnaire. The senior leadership team have spent time reviewing each response and have shared summary findings with teaching staff for their information also. This newsletter will outline some of the key information collated but please also look out for our 'Online Learning from Home' document we will be emailing to you all in the coming days. This leaflet is a direct response to our home learning questionnaire highlighting common challenges our families are facing, with responses from us, as well as advice and support links.

Hillside teachers continue to be committed to planning relevant remote learning and teaching opportunities through Seesaw and we are so pleased to see high levels of engagement across all levels. From poems about this lockdown period, to songs and pictures celebrating our NHS, to children sharing their own personal best scores and wider achievements - we love seeing what our pupils are up to and continue to be very proud!

We want to thank our pupils and families for sharing their home learning and maintaining contact with their teacher during this time. It not only helps us engage with our children to progress learning but it also lets us know that our pupils are well. You will have all received my email last week outlining our approach to tracking engagement going forward. We will be looking for at least one upload from all our pupils to ensure we have some contact on a weekly basis. Ideally, we would like to hear from our pupils regularly throughout a given week. We continue to understand that all home circumstances are different but we will email/call our families we do not hear from in a period of seven days to make sure everything is alright and to ask if we can be of any more support. If you did not receive the email detailing our plans please let us know.

This period is undoubtedly difficult and could very well become more challenging for families the longer school closure and restrictions continue. Therefore, I would like to draw your attention to the new Aberdeenshire Educational Psychology website. ### Home Learning Parental Questionnaire

Please find a summary of our home learning questionnaire below

96 feedback forms have been received so far. Thank you! Of the feedback received, responses are as follows:

### How many activities do our pupils complete using Seesaw?

- Most activities (includes those that try to complete all activities) - 84.6%
- Some activities 14.4%
- Few/none 1%

# What challenges have you found in engaging with home learning?

- Pupil motivation- 64.9%
- Parent work commitments- 52.6%
- Sharing technology- 28.9%
- Access to the internet-5.2%

# What would help to increase the number of Seesaw activities that pupils complete?

- 44.3% of parents/carers would like to see an example of how the task may look when complete
- 40% would like more web links to videos/activities
- 30% would like more paper-based tasks
- 27.1% would like more voice instructions from the teachers
- 25.7% would like more practical tasks
- 10% would like more Seesaw help videos
- 3% would like increased access to technology

## What do our families like about our approach to home learning?

- hearing the teachers voice/seeing teachers in uploaded videos
- the ability to choose when to do activities without set deadlines, allowing for flexibility
- the interface of seesaw

- receiving feedback
- Seesaw is easy to use and navigate
- some tasks are appropriately challenging, and some are just fun!
- the structure of having a clear timetable
- different mediums and choice for responding

We have read all responses received so far and will continue to reflect on these. We hope our additional home learning document (to be emailed in the coming days) will begin to answer some of the questions our families are raising and offer some further guidance. In addition, future newsletters will feature a 'You Said, We did' section which will highlight key responses to parental comments/suggestions.

### Nursery

We would like to continue highlighting our Nursery Twitter page @HS\_Nursery - our practitioners are doing a wonderful job uploading daily challenges for our families to take part in, should they choose to do so. Please note, you are not required to have a Twitter account to see our posts. Simply google twitter along with @Hs\_Nursery. You won't be able to like, comment or share without a personal account, but you will be able to see all the great learning opportunities our EYPs are promoting.

As of this week, Miss Aiton, Mrs Gray, Mrs Forbes and Mrs Milne will upload daily to Twitter, as our Lead Practitioners (Mrs McDermott and Mrs Nelson) support Nursery-Primary transition tasks. On a Friday, we will ask our families to celebrate any wider achievements-just like we usually do on our wider achievements wall at the Nursery entrance!

Today we begin Nursery-Primary 1 transition communication through a dedicated Seesaw account. All families signed up will receive their unique code, by email, by the end of the day. Once you receive this you can login using the Seesaw app or by following this link <a href="https://web.seesaw.me/">https://web.seesaw.me/</a> There will be approximately 3 notifications/activities set each week, reflecting as best we can, key transition elements. We can't wait to start setting activities and engaging with our families through Seesaw!



### Primary 7

However, Mrs Lyndsey requested that we continue to make the most of this week in some way and, as a result, the Primary 7 Seesaw offering will look a little different this week. Look out for a series of uploads that have been well planned to reflect, where possible, some of the skills we would have worked on had we travelled to Abernethy.
